


President's Message

### INDESPENSIBLE FLIES

## Fluttering Caddis



The undisputed champion of fishing dry flies with movement was Leonard Wright, Jr. He recognized that caddis were often more abundant than mayflies. After studying the flop and flutter of caddis emergers, Wright experimented with flies and presentations to imitate their erratic motion. He discovered that dry flies fished with movement can be more effective than those drifting freely. "Movement" is not the same as "drag". A dragging fly is one whose movement is out of control. The current pulls the fly constantly, and it glides across the stream. An active fly is one whose movement is under control.

I remember fishing caddis dry flies on my home river (Colorado's Arkansas River) years ago. This hatch was so different from my usual midge and baetis hatches that I would fish because everything moved so much quicker. The fish would rise quickly, the bugs would hatch quickly, and most importantly, I could skate and twitch my fly. This was a dream come true for a guy who didn't use a fine tippet at that time and needed a LOT of work on his presentation then. One of the first fish I caught with a Fluttering Caddis was during a real caddis hatch came as I was stripping my line up stream getting ready for another cast... The lights turned on, and I spent the rest of the evening loading up my flies with floatant and twitching them across the current. Since then, I have tied lots of flies that are good at both skating and dead drifting. This pattern is no exception. The Fluttering Caddis is designed to act like a caddis that is fluttering around ready to take off or laying eggs. Anyway, tie some up, twitch them around, and catch fish.

Fluttering Caddis is specifically for active presentations. When fishing Fluttering Caddis, cast across and slightly downstream, with the fly line curving upstream. Mend the line as needed to prevent drag and to counteract intervening currents.

#### Recipe:

Hook: TMC 100 Dry fly, #12 – #18 Thread: 8/0 (color to match fly body)

Body: UV Fine & Dry Dubbing (match thread) Wing: Deer of Elk Hair (in various colors)

Hackle: Rooster Saddle hackle

#### Instructions:



STEP 1

Lay a thread base from the eye of the hook down to the bend of the hook.



#### STEP 2

I use super fine dubbing in the color I will tie the fly. You want a nice tight noodle to keep the body as thin as possible. Wrap the material toward the middle of the hook building a slight taper.



#### STEP 3

For the wing you want to get, clean, and stack elk hair (color of your fly). Tie in the hair just so the tip of the hair is slightly past the bend of the hook. Do two loose warps on the hair before tightening it down. Cut the tag ends at an angle to create a tapered to the hooks eye.



STEP 4

Tie off the tag ends creating a nice and even taper to the eye of the hook for the hackle to be tied.



STEP 5
Select a rooster hackle the appropriate for the hooks size. I usually choose to downsize the hackle (size 16 hackle for a size 14 fly). Strip of the end about the distance you are to the eye and tie in leaving the stem sightly exposed for my first wrap. This keeps the first

wrap really clean.



STEP 6
Wrap the hackle forward from the base of the wing to where I will tie off the head. I usually try to wrap five to seven turns of smooth touching wraps then secure the hackle in just before the eye of the hook.



STEP 7
Build a nice smooth head and whip finish the fly.
